City Takes In 2,484 During Month Of May

The City of Monongahela too, \$12,484.23 in revenue during May, with the bulk of it coming from tax sources, the monthly report of City Treasurer Charles L. Haway revealed today.

Payments of 1958 property and capita taxes led the list with total of \$4,462.40; followed by mercantile and mechanical fees of \$3,867.96.

Parking meters yielded \$1,763. wage taxes, \$1,149.00; 1957 property and per capita tax, \$851.51, and the office of City Clerk Mrs. Elizabeth Baker in police court fines and costs and municipal license fees, \$205.50.

Foreign Aid Bill Under Senate Debate

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A Senate fight was taking shape over efforts by both Republicans and Democrats to bring down a foreign aid bill for a \$3,713,000,000 authorization.

The bill under debate was sent to Senate by its Foreign Relations Committee and calls for \$1 billion dollars less than the amount originally requested by President Eisenhower. But it is \$1 billion dollars more than requested by the House.

Allen J. Ellender (D-La.) would propose a series of amendments designed to "cut considerably" the authorization. One of the biggest fights taking form over an amendment by Senate Republican Leader William F. Knowland (Calif.) to tack out a provision authorizing the President to give aid to Soviet satellite if he found it

The awards, coming near the conclusion of the impressive program held in the filled school auditorium, had been closely guarded secrets until their announcement.

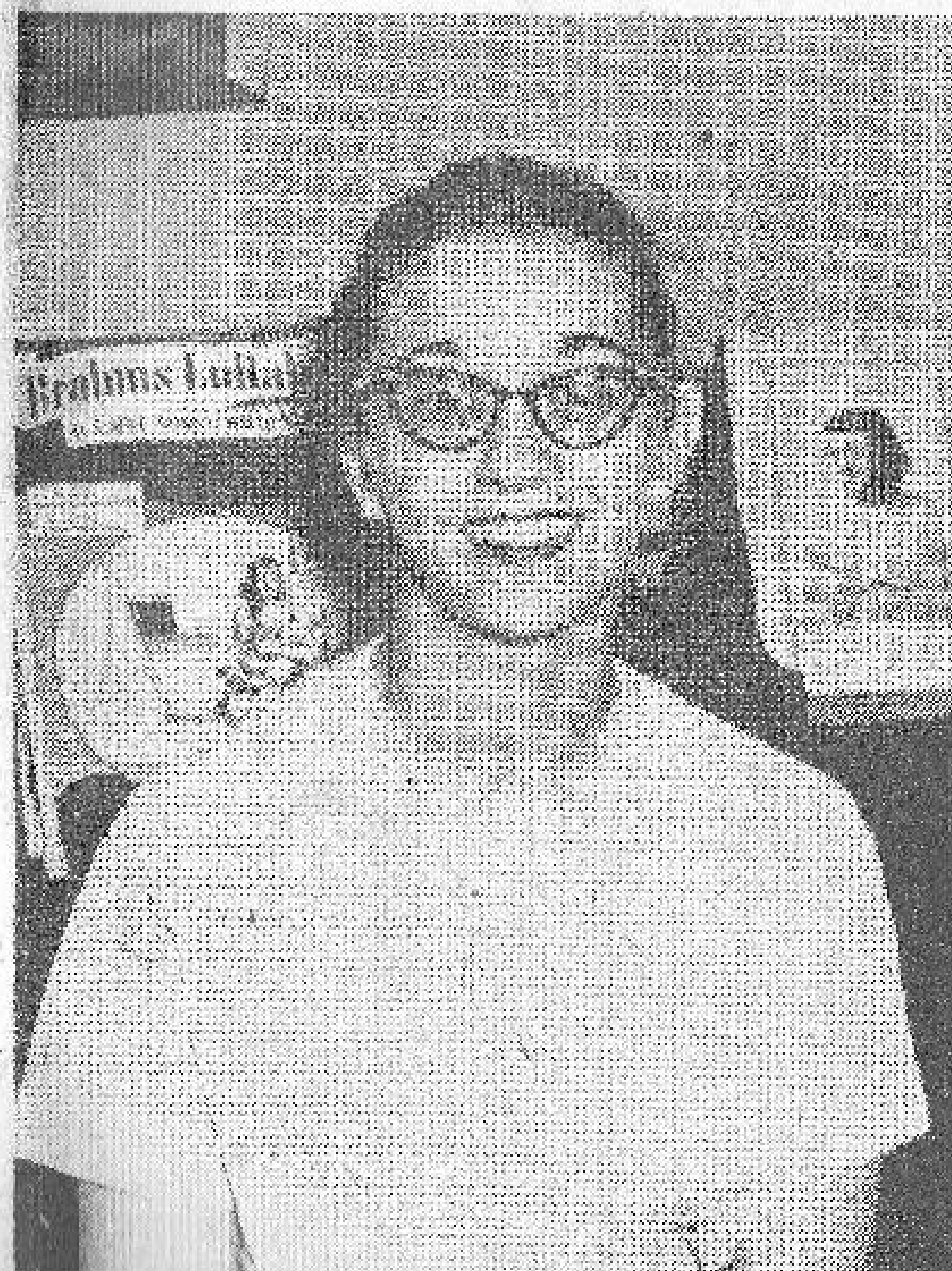

A. R. McLain, General Manager Of C-E Plant, To Be Speaker; Class Night Program Impressive

Two hundred eighteen young men and women, including 212 seniors, five youths who received the necessary credit while in the military service and a young mother who returned to classes and used television instruction to qualify, will receive Monongahela High School diplomas tonight.

The Commencement program, the 78th in the school's long history, will be held at 8 p.m. in the school gymnasium.

The speaker will be Arnold R. McLain, general manager of the Monongahela Division plant of Combustion Engineering, Inc. His subject will be "Have You Chosen Your Road?"

The program will wind-up activities of the Class of 1958, and follows on the heels of impressive Class Night exercises last night in the school auditorium in which honor students and other seniors participated.

Tonight's graduation will swell to 6,235 the ranks of Monongahela High School alumni since the first graduating class of 10 members received diplomas in 1878. Commencements have been held annually since then, with the exception of the years 1881 and 1897.

The Class of 1957, with 225 members, has been the largest in the school's history.

A mechanical engineer by profession, McLain was born on Dec. 30, 1909, in Crandall, Ga., a son of Samuel L. and Amy (Rhinehart) McLain. He was

Through the halls to our classes we tore.

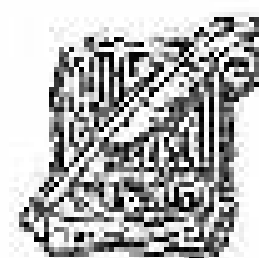

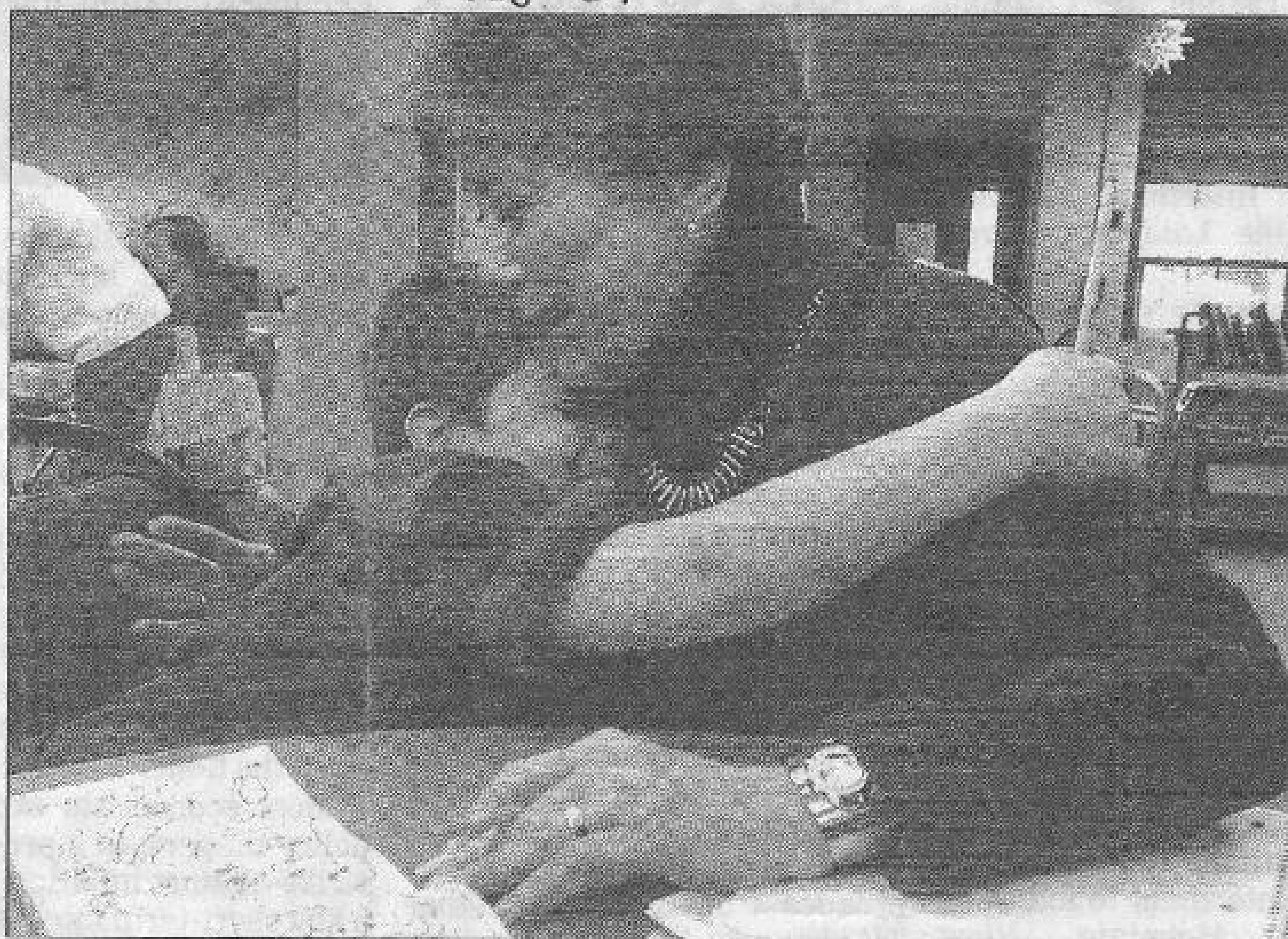
Her involvement doesn't end there, though. "I see them every Sunday at church," Labuda said.

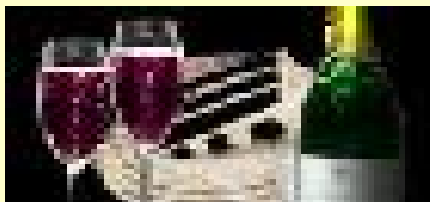
By her example, Labuda teaches perhaps the greatest lesson of them all.

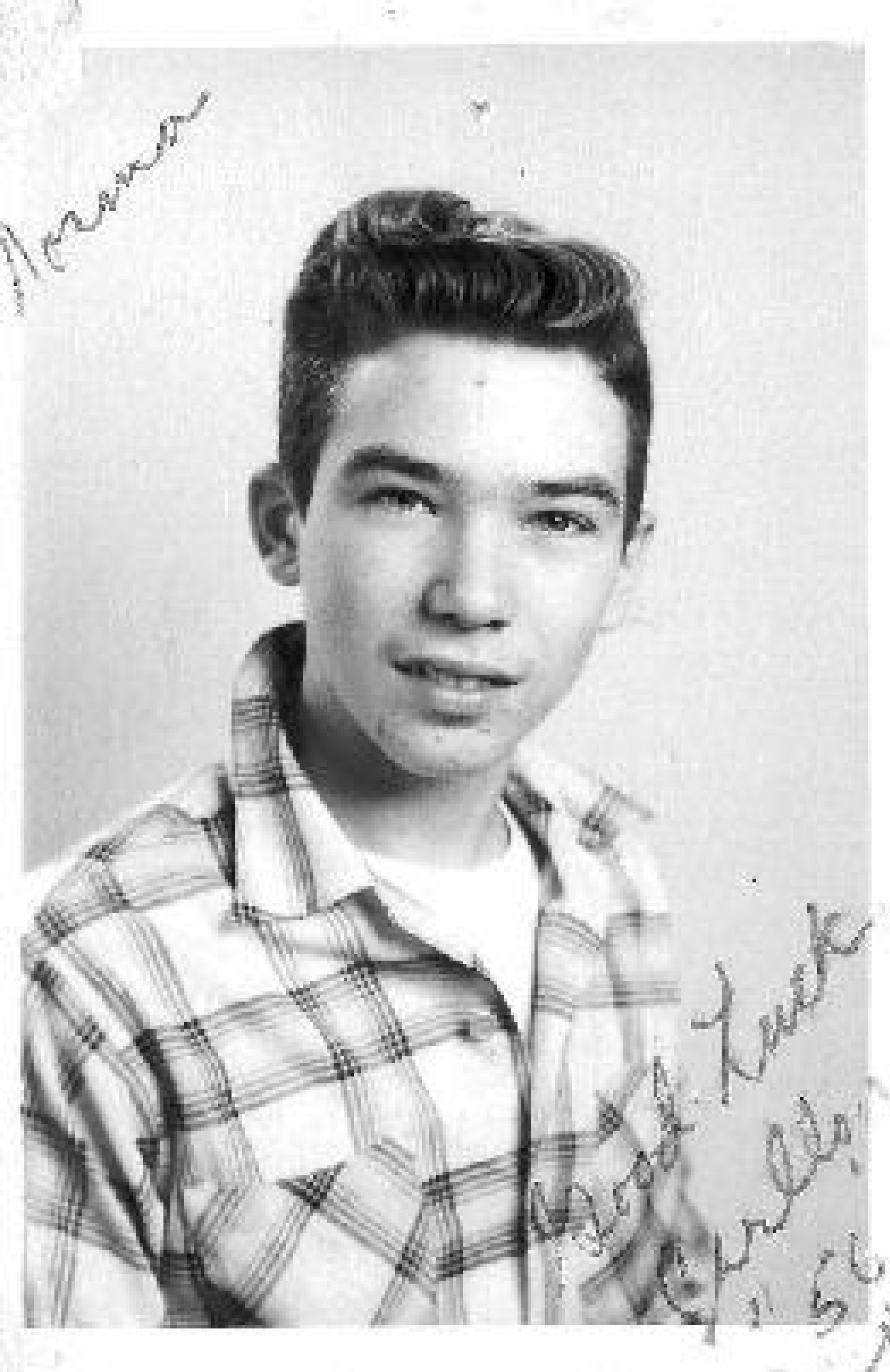

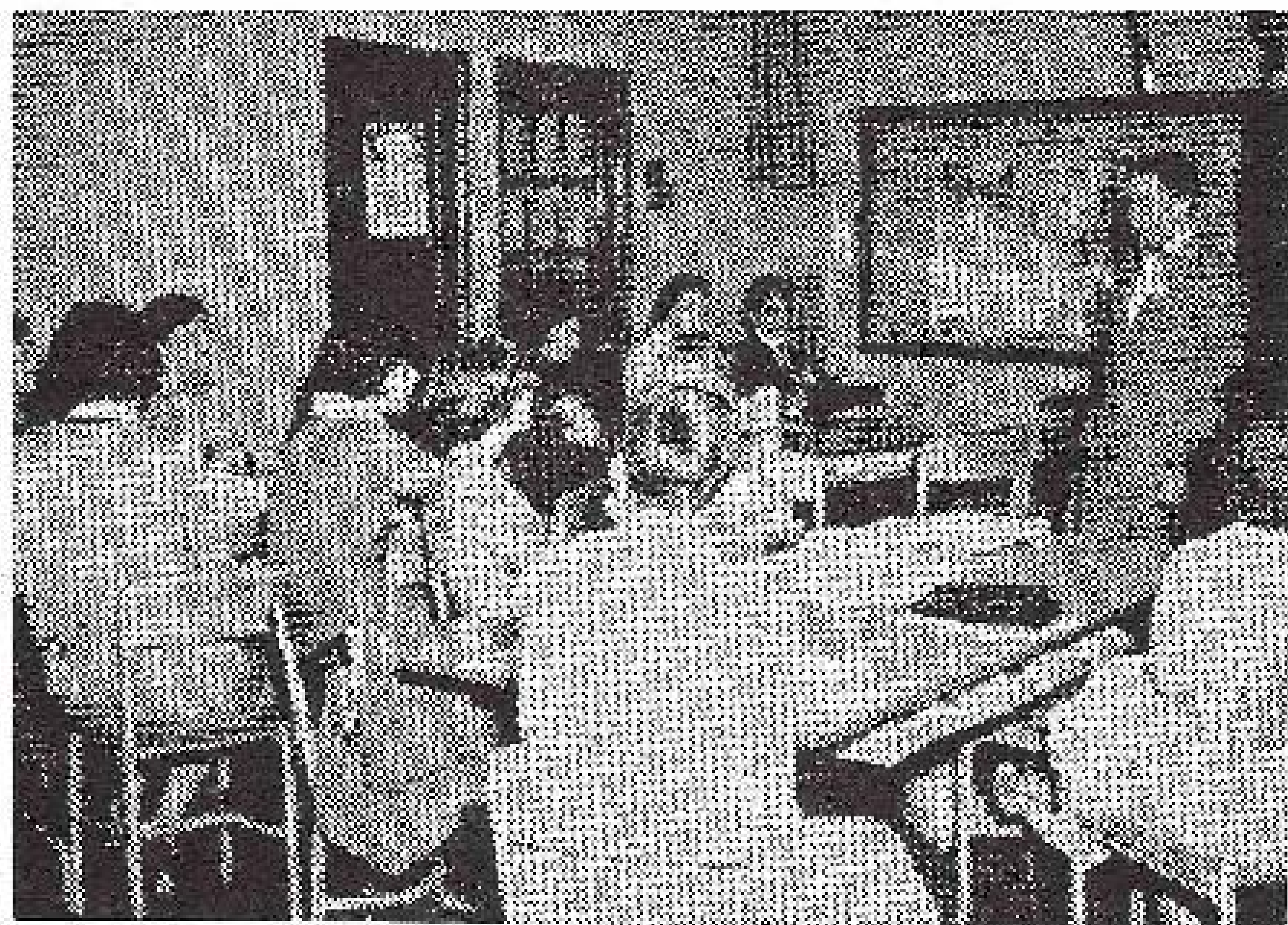

MHS Juniors Earn "Superior" Ratings In State Forensics

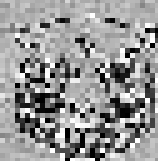
